### 7.3 Principal's Report: Olwen Cowan

- Had a great remembrance day assembly
- One of our divisions went to We Day
- Our book fair and the book bingo were very successful. Kids really loved it.
- FSA results came in last Monday and were fantastic; they helped to show what work we have to do
- Had some communication from community members regarding homemade signs along Chaster Road indicating that it is a school zone. We are actually a playground zone, so they have made complaints to the RCMP.
- School Growth Plan, they are focusing on 2 goals this year - literacy and self-regulation. They have set targets which will be reported to the school board and to parents.
- Literacy goal has been a focus for the past 4-5 years and is going really well
- Self-regulation goal they are looking at bringing in more strategies and resources to aid teachers and students
- The school growth plan will be available on the school website
- 'December Actually' winter production is on December $19^{\text {th }}$, both the matinee and evening show will be held that day.

- Attended a meeting on Nov $26^{\text {th }}$ on behalf of the DPAC chair. The meeting was held at the school board office and was held to discuss the topic of independent travel. It was run as a workshop with representatives from many groups, such as local government, transportation, DPAC, etc. Topic was to discuss what is preventing children from getting out and about on their own. A study has been initiated and they are focusing on our community, and will eventually focus on one school. The study will take place over the next year.



### 8.2 Past PAC Planning Projects:

- Scott:
- Past project ideas discussed by PAC were a kitchen renovation and an outdoor covered play area, or a natural play area.
- Scott presented a slide show of past ideas the PAC has looked at, and possibilities of what we can create.
- Olwyn:
- The manager of facilities came to our school this week and toured it with Olwyn. Discussed options for the Cedar Grove area, such as natural play area.
- Looked at kitchen/change room area. We are very far down the list for a renovation, possibly 8-10 years. Something to think about is that there is likely asbestos under the floor, so any reno would include abatement and additional costs.
- Would love to see an outdoor covered play area; teachers are interested in this as well.

| 9.4 Treasurer Position: <br> - Lyle needs to step down as treasurer as he now needs to take care of his parents almost full time. Per the PAC constitution, we do not need to vote in a new treasurer. Instead, the PAC executive can assign someone. We heard that June Metz may be interested; <br> Tracy and Eliina to confirm if June Metz will volunteer to be treasurer. Eliina and Tracy will follow-up with her. Once we have confirmed a new treasurer an executive meeting will be held to officially appoint them and review the role. We will also ask Linda Shute if she's willing to do some training with the new person. |  |  |  |  |
| 9.5 Spending Decisions: <br> - Would like to build a Lego wall in the library for a 'make-it' experience. The school is asking for $\$ 500$ toward the building of the wall. <br> - Family book club proposal, last year we ran our first book club and 2 novels were selected. Would like to run another book club after the winter break to build connections between home and school, encourage a joy of reading and support literacy. Request is for $\$ 500$ <br> - Motion: Tara motioned to accept both requests, seconded by Eliina. Motion was approved. The executive will investigate if this can come from the gaming account, if not will come from the discretionary fund. <br> - Request for 'Headstart Public Speaking' program for 4 intermediate classes (Tultz, MacInnes 6/7, Calvori $4 / 5$, Peter Metcalfe is pending). The total amount for the course is $\$ 3000$ per class less $10 \%$, so the approximately $\$ 11,000$. Some present were concerned that this is a large expense that is not benefiting the entire school; noted that they would like to see something for the primaries but that it would be difficult to match the money. There was also concern that this is a significant amount of money. <br> - Motion: Scott Davis motioned for the PAC to put \$2000 toward the Headstart Public Speaking program, seconded by Tara Robens. ## Update from SOGI district committee for Cedar Grove PAC from Lorna Richards elementary parent volunteer.

## Background

SOGI stands for sexual orientation and gender identity. It is an inclusive term that encompasses all individuals regardless of where they identify on the sexual orientation or gender identity spectrums, as every person has a sexual orientation and every person has a gender identity. It includes heterosexual, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, two-spirit, cisgender, and more.
In July 2016, the provincial government amended the BC Human Rights Code to include gender expression as prohibited grounds of discrimination (sexual orientation was added earlier to the Code). In September 2016, the Ministry of Education announced that explicit references to sexual orientations and gender identities must be included in all public and independent school district's codes of conduct.

The Ministry of Education has also recently implemented a redesigned curriculum, which provides educators the opportunity to teach in a more inclusive and personalized way. The content in the redesigned provincial curriculum includes a focus on valuing diversity and respecting differences, and the topics of human rights and responses to discrimination (especially in subject areas of Physical and Health Education, Social Studies, and English Language Arts). Components of the BC Human Rights Code, including sexual orientation and gender identity, may be explored within those curricular themes. The expectation of this mandated curriculum is that all students in all schools will experience the integration of inclusive education beginning in Kindergarten. It is important to note that curriculum is provincially mandated and adherence to the BC Human Rights Code is not optional for public schools and school districts. The use of SOGI 123 resources is at the discretion of individual districts, however it was developed and approved by the Ministry of Education and BC Teachers' Federation so it is the most readily available resource that is compliant with the BC Human Rights Code. SOGI 123 is also supported by several other professional organizations and associations, including the BC Confederation of Parent Advisory Councils and the majority of school districts in the province (51 out of 60 as of May 2018) use SOGI 123

## The District Committee

The Sunshine Coast district SOGI committee is made up of several elementary and high school principals, volunteer teachers and school administrators as well as several elementary and high school parents. In 2020, 2 high school students will also join the committee (the application process will begin soon for those students).
The main mandate of the district committee is to oversee several initiatives related to the SOGI topic. Most notably, organizing the training of the school reps in the district. This training happened Oct. 28, and there was a representative from every school. The representative from Cedar Grove is Ms. Reid, the librarian. Each rep was given a resource kit.
Another function of the district SOGI committee is to organize training for schools related to this topic. There is an organization in Vancouver called Out in Schools.
"Out In Schools is an award-winning program that brings films into classrooms to inspire youth to step into the challenges and the triumphs of LGBT2Q+ communities. We engage youth through film in the promotion of safe and inclusive learning environments, free from homophobia, transphobia and bullying. Out In Schools has reached more than 100,000 youth since we started visiting schools in 2004. We've brought queer film and transformative discussion to 57 of BC's 60 school districts in that time! Out In Schools also works closely with governments, school districts, professionals, associations and corporations to ensure that everyone has access to our dynamic presentations."

Out in Schools did deliver presentations to various schools in sd 46 last year, the schools for 2020 are to be determined.
